David Oshinsky, *Bellevue: Three Centuries of Medicine and Mayhem at America's Most Storied Hospital*

"On TV, from Law & Order to Nurse Jackie, Bellevue is a place of crime victims, psychopaths, derelicts, and lunatics, emerging as a dark, mysterious, yet utterly essential place. In the nineteenth century, newspaper moguls Hearst and Pulitzer rivaled each other to feature Bellevue in scarier exposes of a public institution run amok. The splashiest sent reporter Nellie Bly to spend ten days in Bellevue's madhouse. After that, mayhem seemed to overshadow anything Bellevue might achieve by way of medicine. Yet when the President or the Pope visits New York and a medical crisis arises, it is also Bellevue's level one trauma unit that awaits them..."

Gregory Bush, White Sand Black Beach: Civil Rights, Public Space and Miami's Virginia Key
"In May 1945, activists staged a 'wade-in' at a whites-only beach in Miami, protesting
the Jim Crow—era laws that denied blacks access to recreational waterfront areas.
Pressured by protestors in this first postwar civil rights demonstration, the Dade County
Commission ultimately designated the difficult-to-access Virginia Key as a beach for
African Americans. The beach became vitally important to the community, offering a
place to congregate with family and friends and to enjoy the natural wonders of the area.
It was also a tangible victory in the continuing struggle for civil rights in public space..."

Caitlin Fitz, Our Sister Republics: The United States in an Age of American Revolutions "Before the storm over Panama, before the stream into Texas, and before a new party system redefined the United States with a hearty narrative of exceptionalism, Our Sister Republics reveals that the hope for a democratic Western Hemisphere once prevailed with such force that it shaped popular understandings of revolution, republicanism, and America itself..."

Thursday, April 6
